SECRETARY'S REPORT FOR THE AGM
ON SATURDAY 25 SEPTEMBER 2021

Unsurprisingly, the usual in-person meetings, receptions, dinners and other social gatherings and events have not happened over the last 12 months, and there was no 2020 Reunion at the College. However, the University-wide Alumni Festival has again been taking place over the last week and hopefully will have proved some consolation for those who would have come to Cambridge for the Reunion in a normal year.

But with the help of technology, especially videoconferencing and email, there has been plenty of Society activity, including some excellent events, and the Society is looking to make more use of social media in the future. Also, while in the past copies of the Journal have been available in PDF format as well as in print, the latest edition was for the first time a fully electronic publication.

Your committee has as usual met twice in the last year. These have been virtual meetings, using *Zoom* videoconferencing technology, which is also being used for this AGM. The committee are grateful to the Director of Communications and Engagement, Dr Nicola Jones, for setting up and hosting these meetings.

Two sub-committees have been active. The Strategy group, chaired by our President, Judith Bunting, has met 4 times, in November 2020 and in January, April and June this year, focussing on future social events and increased opportunities to bring students and alumni together. Each meeting was attended by one or more guests – these included the MCR and JCR Presidents, representatives of Clubs and Societies, and Hannah Okorafor, who kindly agreed to help the Society make better use of social media. These meetings have so far resulted in two successful events, with plans for another to be held later in the year. The November meeting reviewed plans for the annual Careers Fair fixed for later that month, and the potential for holding more frequent CV clinics for students, as well as CV and career clinics or workshops for graduates who are thinking of changing jobs or switching their careers in a different direction. The January meeting planned an online social event to be held in March replace the usual London Drinks. John Lees (1977) a career strategist, attended the April meeting as a guest, to help plan a CV workshop which he had kindly agreed to hold for graduates. That meeting and also the meeting in June discussed plans for an event with a musical theme to be held in the late summer or early autumn. This has now been arranged to take place following this meeting.

The Grants sub-committee again used email to discuss the applications it had received under the Society's programme of grants for student activities and projects, which started in the academic year 2014-15. A sub-committee of the

Society, chaired by Rachael Webb, liaises with the MCR and JCR Presidents in the Michaelmas term each year to discuss the process and timetable for applications for grants, and the criteria to apply to them. For each of the last few years, a maximum of £2,000 has been made available, and this was increased to £3,000 this year. There were 8 applications, and £2,550.50 was awarded to 5 applicants, 3 applications being declined as they did not meet the criteria. 2 awards were made to the MCR, 1 to the JCR and 2 to individuals. Particular thanks are again due to Rachael Webb for her hard work in driving this programme and providing feedback to the applicants.

The annual Careers Fair was held online in November last year. Feedback suggested that students and alumni attending found the format had worked well, and that the use of videoconferencing had demonstrated that there are opportunities for holding careers events more frequently in the future. It was also clear that more alumni are likely to be willing to attend if they do not have to travel. The fair was conducted mainly in small groups using *Zoom*, and Students were asked to book into group sessions that interested them. Some alumni provided pre-recorded video material which was circulated in advance. There was also a CV clinic with 15-20 minute one-to-one sessions throughout the afternoon. which proved very popular and were fully booked within about 2 hours of going live. Alumni were approached direct with invitations to take part, and all those approached agreed to do so.

Replacing the London Drinks was in a successful and well attended event featuring a fascinating talk by Professor Richard Selley, a geologist and English wine expert. He told us something about the geography and geology of vine growing and wine production and the likely impact on them of climate change. The evening started with an introduction from the Master and ended with short breakout sessions enabling alumni to catch up with some of their contemporaries.

John Lees' CV workshop in the early summer attracted a good turnout, with 59 alumni registering, and excellent feedback, the comments showing a clear appetite for more events about presenting oneself in the jobs market.

The Trust Sub-Committee has not met in the last year. It was formed to liaise with the College about the annual programme of awards from the Fitzwilliam Society Trust Fund. The College administers this programme in accordance with details agreed with the Society in December 2007, when the charitable company which had previously made the awards handed over to the College the custody and management of the trust fund and the administration of the awards. The trust fund was built up over many years from donations, and its income is used to make the awards. These typically total between £10,000 and £11,000 each year, although fewer awards were made in the last 2 unusual years. They include academic scholarships and prizes, a grant to the library, prizes for

debating and grants for music and arts projects. The role of the sub-committee is to consider, and if thought fit to approve, any changes to the awards programme proposed by the College. A detailed report on the Trust Fund awards for 2020-21 has been provided separately.

Thanks are due to many people for their support of the Society during the year, including Dr Nicola Jones, the Director of Communications and Engagement, and her team, Dr Paul Chirico, the Senior Tutor and the Master. Nicola has also produced an excellent electronic editions of the *Journal* in her first year as Editor. And finally, we must thank our President, Judith Bunting. She had done an amazing job in reinvigorating the Strategy Group, which is the Society's primary planning and decision making body.

Hon Treasurer's Report on the accounts for the year to 31 July 2021

The Society's surplus of £5,291 shows a year-on-year increase of £4,320 compared with the previous year's surplus of £971.

The London Dinner during the year was cancelled due to the coronavirus pandemic. The Dinner planned for 14th May 2020 had also been cancelled. No costs were incurred.

The 2020 Journal was produced at a total cost of £7,366 (down £20,025 or 73% on the previous year's total of £27,391). Following the rationalisation of student subscriptions in 2014/15, subscription income has reduced. The Society has met the reduced costs of £7,366 for this year only. The 2021 figure includes an apportionment of the Editor's costs for the first time. A fresh review of the Society's contribution formula has been delayed but will be conducted during the early part of Michaelmas term 2021. The 2020 Journal's much reduced cost is the result of digitisation and a reduction in postal costs.

The Society, with grateful thanks to John Lees (English 1977), ran a successful remote Careers' Fair by Zoom on a Saturday evening in June, with almost 40 attending (of 59 signed up) from Fitz and other colleges. John led a one hour interactive session on writing CVs, and feedback had been amazingly good. With those who had suffered redundancy, the session was deemed very supportive, and there was a clear desire for more events about how to present oneself in the jobs market. It was generally agreed that there should be a careers networking event in summer 2022, possibly to invite a head-hunter from Fitz alumni, and to involve the MCR to hear about the plans of graduate students who do not intend to go into academia. The event incurred no costs.

The Society provided grants for five student projects totalling £2,551 (£1,455 in 2020). The grants sub-committee selected the projects from a total of eight submitted by the JCR and MCR and were very much assisted in their task by the Senior Tutor. The "Student Grants for Projects" cycle is now well-established. Its operation is under review for future years.

The net assets of the Society, were £45,355 (£40,044 in July 2020). These are lent interest-free to the College to the benefit of the Fitzwilliam Society Trust Fund, income from which supports a range of student and research activities.

I should like to thank the Honorary Independent Examiner, Roger Smith, for his work.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS:

1. The subscriptions shown above are those received in the period from members currently at the College.
Subscription levels were reviewed in 2014-15, with all students (JCR and MCR) now paying on an equivalent basis.
2. Donations received from members of the Society towards costs of printing the Journal and the Careers brochure.
3. The London Dinner was cancelled due to Covid-19, and no costs were incurred, as happened the previous year.
4. The Society and the College share the cost of printing/distributing the Fitzwilliam Journal to those members of the College who are members of the Society. The Society agreed to meet costs during the year, which at £7,366 was below the previous year's costs of £27,391, mainly as a result of digitisation and reduced postage.
The figure includes an apportionment of the Editor's costs. A new funding formula will be discussed in September.
5. No refreshment costs were incurred on the Careers Fair in June 2021, as the event was held remotely (2019: £446)
6. For a range of titles in the Student Café. Only Time Magazine was renewed this year. More renewals due in 2021-22.
7. The Society made five grants (total £2,551) to the MCR and JCR.
8. The Society's assets are on loan interest-free to Fitzwilliam College, to the benefit of the Society's Trust fund at the College. The fund supports the College by awarding scholarships and prizes, funding research awards and the Milner Walton Music & Drama Awards, and an annual library grant.
9. The surplus of £5,291 is high because the Society's share of Journal costs has fallen by £4,497 (or 38%) over the 2020 figure of £11,863.

FITZWILLIAM SOCIETY AGM 2021

Proposals to make changes to the Society's Constitution

The meeting will be asked to vote on proposals to make several alterations to Rules 1, 4 and 8 of the Society's Constitution. Rule 12 says that "*The Rules of the Society shall not be repealed or altered without the consent of a majority of the members present and voting at a General Meeting of the Society*".

Proposal 1

That the existing Rule 1 is replaced by the following text

"1. Every member (other than an associate member) of Fitzwilliam College, Cambridge, and every living former Master of the College, shall be a member of the Society, subject (in the case of students at Fitzwilliam College, and alumni of Fitzwilliam College or Fitzwilliam House) to payment of such Life or other membership subscription (if any) as the Committee of the Society may determine from time to time."

Comments

The effect of the current wording is unclear. In particular, it says that Fellows are honorary members of the Society while they are in office, so drawing a distinction between Fellows and members of the College (who are members of the Society subject to paying the life or annual subscription). There is a conflict between the Rule and the College's Statutes, which define membership of the College widely, and extends to Fellows. The reference to living former masters is included in the proposed replacement text because the statute defining membership of the College does not mention them. This may be considered unnecessary, as all former masters are entitled (if they wish) to become Life Fellows, and current practice is to elect them as Honorary Fellows; under the statute both Life Fellows and Honorary Fellows are members of the College. All the living former masters are both Life Fellows and Honorary Fellows. The Committee also feel that the distinction between ordinary and honorary members is unnecessary, and also strange, since Fellows are eligible to be Officers of the Society.

Proposal 2

In the fourth paragraph of Rule 4 add "*Director of Communications and Engagement,*" immediately before "*Bursar*"

Comments

About 10 years ago, Rule 4 was altered to say that the Development Director should be an *ex officio* member of the Society's Committee. This coincided with the abolition of the roles of Cambridge Secretary and Dinner Secretary, and the expansion of the activities of the Development Office, which took over the functions of these 2 roles, and in so doing worked more closely with the Society than previously. The functions of the Development Office were recently split, with the formation of a new Communications Office. This has taken over the part of the work previously carried out by the Development Office which involves particularly close liaison with the Society. It is headed by the former Development Director, Dr Nicola Jones, in the newly created role of Director of Communications and Engagement, while a new Development Director has been appointed. The Committee of the Society feel that it would assist the Society to have both Directors as members of the Committee.

Proposal 3

In the sixth paragraph of Rule 4 add “*A meeting of the Committee may be held remotely using video-conferencing technology. Voting may take place at such a meeting*”.

Comments

Since the pandemic has prevented in-person Committee meetings being held in 2020 and 2021, the Committee has had to consider whether to hold them remotely using videoconferencing technology, or to skip them. This was an easy decision; Rule 4 says “*The Committee shall meet at least twice in every year*” and there is nothing in the Rules expressly stating that meetings must be held in-person. So arguably this change is unnecessary, but the Committee feel that it would be helpful to say that remote meeting are permitted. It was thought that there might be situations in the future where an in-person meeting could lawfully be held, but where (particularly because of Covid-19) arranging it would present practical difficulties and/or several committee members might be unable or unwilling to attend in person. Indeed, with the latest relaxation of restrictions, this is probably the case now.

Proposal 4

At the end of Rule 8, add “*A General Meeting may be held remotely using video-conferencing technology. Voting may take place at such a meeting. A General Meeting held remotely shall be hosted from the College, and if no Reunion in person takes place, the Annual General Meeting shall be held on such date in late September and at such time as the Committee shall decide*”

Comments

Most of the comments about Proposal 3 apply here as well. The final sentence allows some limited flexibility about the timing of the meeting if it is not possible to arrange the usual Reunion weekend at the College.

The current wording and proposed altered wording of the Rules are set out in Appendices A and B below, with the proposed new wording shown in bold in Appendix B.

Appendix A – The current Rules

1. Every member of Fitzwilliam College, Cambridge shall be eligible for ordinary membership on payment of the Life or Annual Membership Subscription, which will be decided from time to time by the Committee of the Society. Fellows of the College shall be Honorary Members during their period of tenure. Honorary Members may also be elected by the Committee from time to time, by the unanimous vote of those present at a Committee Meeting. Honorary members shall not pay a subscription, and, except for Fellows of the College, shall not be eligible as Officers or members of the Committee. In other respects they shall be as other members.

2. The Officers of the Society shall be a President, one or more Vice-Presidents, an Honorary Secretary, an Honorary Treasurer, and an Editor of the Journal. The Officers, with the exception of the Vice-Presidents, shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting, and shall be eligible for re-election from year to year.

3. The Committee may, by the unanimous vote of those present, elect as a Vice-President any person who in their opinion has rendered special service to the Society or to Fitzwilliam College. There shall be not more than ten elected Vice-Presidents, and each shall remain in office permanently, or until resignation, or until members at an AGM shall think it proper to remove them. The Master of Fitzwilliam, and former Masters, shall be *ex officio* Vice-Presidents.

4. The management of the affairs of the Society shall be vested in the Committee, subject to the regulation and control of the members assembled at a General Meeting.

The Committee shall consist of the Officers (Rule 2) and nine ordinary members who shall be elected at an AGM. Three of these Committee members shall retire, but be available for re-election, at every AGM. The retiring members shall be those who have been longest in office since their last election.

The Committee may co-opt additional members, in each case for a specified period or to assist with a particular task or project. The membership of each co-opted member shall cease at the end of the specified period or, as applicable, when the particular task or project is completed, but may then be renewed by the Committee for a further specified period.

The Development Director, Bursar and Senior Tutor of Fitzwilliam College shall each be, *ex officio*, a member of the Committee.

The JCR President and MCR President shall each be, *ex officio*, a member of the Committee for the period of his or her term of office and for the following year.

Casual vacancies on the Committee or amongst the Officers or Honorary Independent Examiner, may be filled by the Committee. A member so appointed shall retire at the time when the replaced member would have retired.

The Committee shall meet at least twice in every year.

5. The Committee may appoint sub-committees to deal with any particular business. The work of the sub-committees shall be subject to review by the Committee.

6. The administration of the Funds of the Society shall be vested in the Committee, who may invest or otherwise deal with the funds on behalf of the Society as in their discretion they think fit. The Hon. Treasurer will administer the Society funds on behalf of the Committee. In the event of incapacity, this responsibility will pass to the Hon. Secretary in the first instance, or the vacancy will be filled by the Committee.

7. The Committee shall submit to each Annual General Meeting

(a) From the Hon Secretary, a report of the activities of the Committee and the sub-committees.

(b) From the Hon. Treasurer, a report of the financial position of the Society, including a Statement of Accounts up to the end of the Society's financial year, showing Income and Expenditure and Assets and Liabilities at that date. This Statement of Accounts will have been reported on by an Honorary Independent Examiner elected at an AGM, and who may be re-elected at subsequent AGMs. He or she shall not be an Officer or member of the Committee.

8. The Annual General Meeting shall be held at the College during the Reunion weekend at the time specified in the Reunion programme. Each AGM shall

- receive the Honorary Secretary's report
- receive the Honorary Treasurer's report
- receive a report on the Fitzwilliam Society Trust Fund

- elect the Officers, the members of the Committee and the Honorary Independent Examiner.

Any other General Meeting of the Society may be summoned by the Committee at such time and place as it shall determine. Notice of such Meeting and the business to be transacted shall be sent to each member of the Society at least 14 days before the date appointed.

9. A quorum for General Meetings of the Society will be fifteen members; and for meetings of the Committee five members (provided in each case that one member is an Officer). All motions brought before a General Meeting shall be decided by a majority of those present. Where voting is equally divided, the presiding Officer shall have an additional casting vote.

The President will preside at all General or Committee Meetings of the Society. In the President's absence the senior Vice-President, or failing a Vice-President the senior member of the Committee will preside. In the event of the incapacity or death of the President, the immediate Past-President shall become the Acting President.

10. Minutes of General Meetings and Committee Meetings shall be kept by the Hon. Secretary. At each Committee Meeting, the minutes of the previous meeting shall be approved and signed by the presiding Officer with the consent of the meeting. Minutes of each General Meeting shall be approved and signed by the Officer presiding at the meeting.

11. Should the College cease to record addresses of Society members' or otherwise cease effectively to maintain contact with members, the Society will endeavour to do so in accordance with its objectives.

12. The Rules of the Society shall not be repealed or altered without the consent of a majority of the members present and voting at a General Meeting of the Society. A proposal to repeal or alter the Rules must be indicated in the notice convening a General Meeting.

13. The Society's financial year end shall be determined from time to time by the Committee.

Appendix B – The proposed altered Rules

1. **Every member (other than an associate member) of Fitzwilliam College, Cambridge, and every living former Master of the College, shall be a member of the Society, subject (in the case of students at Fitzwilliam College, and alumni of Fitzwilliam College or Fitzwilliam House) to payment of such Life or other membership subscription (if any) as the Committee of the Society may determine from time to time.**
2. The Officers of the Society shall be a President, one or more Vice-Presidents, an Honorary Secretary, an Honorary Treasurer, and an Editor of the Journal. The Officers, with the exception of the Vice-Presidents, shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting, and shall be eligible for re-election from year to year.
3. The Committee may, by the unanimous vote of those present, elect as a Vice-President any person who in their opinion has rendered special service to the Society or to Fitzwilliam College. There shall be not more than ten elected Vice-Presidents, and each shall remain in office permanently, or until resignation, or until members at an AGM shall think it proper to remove them. The Master of Fitzwilliam, and former Masters, shall be *ex officio* Vice-Presidents.
4. The management of the affairs of the Society shall be vested in the Committee, subject to the regulation and control of the members assembled at a General Meeting.
The Committee shall consist of the Officers (Rule 2) and nine ordinary members who shall be elected at an AGM. The Committee shall meet at least twice in every year. **A meeting of the Committee may be held remotely using video-conferencing technology. Voting may take place at such a meeting.**
5. The Committee may appoint sub-committees to deal with any particular business. The work of the sub-committees shall be subject to review by the Committee.
6. The administration of the Funds of the Society shall be vested in the Committee, who may invest or otherwise deal with the funds on behalf of the Society as in their discretion they think fit. The Hon. Treasurer will administer the Society funds on behalf of the Committee. In the event of incapacity, this responsibility will pass to the Hon. 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shall be hosted from the College, and if no Reunion in person takes place, the Annual General Meeting shall be held on such date in late September and at such time as the Committee shall decide.

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
